

GU just concluded its twelfth semester of Experience First, pairing teams of students with partnering organizations to reach the partners' goals. Why do we choose this restaurant over that one?
Playground equipment and family-friendly pricing? Quiet spaces conducive to business conversations? Country music and down-home cooking? Dozens of details from lighting and noise to server friendliness and speed make statements—intended or unintended.

GU marketing students like Emma accepted
Professor Jane Bell's charge to practice
business analysis skills by eating out and
thoroughly assessing "the customer
experience." They examined influences
like the restaurant's social media activity

and promotions, processes, visual appeal of entrees, customer comfort, décor, and more. They also identified problems and recommended solutions they would implement if they were managers, like quicker delivery of orders, more frequent cleaning of restrooms, clearing tables before seating the next customers, and showing staff how to resolve errors promptly and with grace.

"I WAS A STRANGER AND YOU WELCOMED ME"

As staff at the International Institute-St. Louis readied for the arrival of Afghan refugees, Callie Adkins and her classmates in Introduction to Social Work lent helping hands.

The opportunity to serve and learn enlarged their window into the world of social work, particularly the grace, maturity, and discipline it takes to set "self" aside for the sake of others.

The students also lunched at Sameem Afghan Restaurant, where co-owner Qayum

Mohammad recounted his exodus from Afghanistan years ago as a teen. Fearful of Soviet takeover, he left along with his brothers and less than \$80 in his pocket.

"How terrifying would that be?" Callie Adkins wondered.

Today, she recalls the restaurateur telling the students, "I'm living the American dream." Her vivid memory of the experience fuels a dream, too. She imagines a career helping marginalized persons "come out on the other side, stronger than when they went in."



"Great experiential learning," said Derrick Ferguson '23 of the criminal justice conference he and his classmates had just attended. "D-Ferg" describes himself as a "hands-on" learner. His participation in the conference reaffirmed his vision of someday working in juvenile corrections.

D-Ferg also filled requirements for a juvenile delinquency course by working with youth in a local after-school program. After logging in the required hours, he

continued to serve, just for the joy of serving.

Professor of Criminal Justice Michael Laughlin '99 believes that connecting students to many different persons and experiences invites discovery. Often, students realize their God-given gifts and begin to see law enforcement as a calling. This year, Laughlin orchestrated hands-on learning across four courses to benefit 70 students.

REALITY CHECK: THERE IS NO "AWAY"

Batteries, antifreeze, chlorine bleach, drain cleaner—toxic household chemicals fill our kitchens and garages. As for their disposal, Biology Professor Eric Nord says, "There is no 'away.' We can't just throw something away and think we've done our part."

Students touring the Veolia Environmental Services plant in Sauget, Illinois, last fall considered problems and solutions surrounding toxic waste. Veolia's incinerator vaporizes hazardous waste at 1,800 degrees Fahrenheit and destroys 99.99% of its hazardous constituents.

Though Veolia's capabilities impressed students, Nord guided them to examine other solutions as well, like their roles as consumers. "I try to build into each class

a sense of our connection to the world," he says. "As a society, we're so deep into a consumer mindset that it's hard for the students to imagine anything else."

Sometimes a student's passion for learning needs a refresh. For Adin Fleischer, that refresh took place at a monastery.



The trip presented opportunities for Adin and his classmates to reflect on their studies overall and the hard work they've put in so far. It helped them renew their perspectives and re-instill a passion for learning. Adin calls the experiential aspect of following St. Meinrad's peaceful pace "much-needed."

"We all needed a break from the books and the ministry of theology and needed to be poured into," Adin says. "We all came back feeling like new people. My roommate said I looked like I had a spiritual massage."

SEEING THROUGH YOUR EYES

If it's true that empathy is seeing with the eyes, listening with the ears, and feeling with the heart of another, then sophomore Katie Chavez is on her way to becoming an empathetic teacher. Her experiences this year at the Central Institute for the Deaf (CID) and the Missouri School for the Blind gave her new appreciation for the ability of learners to adapt—children as they learn about their world, and teachers as they learn how their children learn.

At the CID, she watched children, both deaf and hard of hearing, respond to skilled teachers. At the school for the blind, she paid close attention to her own movements using vision impairment goggles on a high-ropes course. The experiences helped her understand how children with physical challenges learn and how she could make a difference in the classroom. Katie reflects that both trips took away any preconceived notions about children with physical challenges: "They're just like all other kids; they like to play and make friends."


